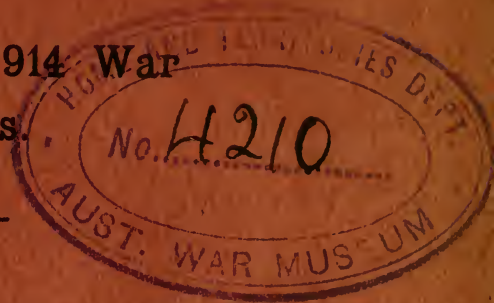

Note.—Field Service Manuals are not the authority for the supply of war outfit of units. The details laid down in latest Mobilization Store Tables, Equipment Regulations, Clothing Regulations, &c., will be followed.

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AUSTRALIAN WAR MEMORIAL
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Section 1.—GENERAL NOTES.

1. Basis of establishment and outfit.*—The tables contained in this manual are drawn up on the basis of a campaign in a civilized country, and in a temperate climate. When mobilization takes place under different conditions, certain modifications will become necessary, and will be notified from the War Office.

2. War establishment.—The normal war establishment of the various medical units required for the Expeditionary Force, showing their composition as regards *personnel* and animals, is given in Section 2.

3. Transport.—The transport of a cavalry field ambulance or field ambulance is shown after its war establishment. The transport is divided in the field as follows:—

1st line—which always accompanies the unit on the march; ambulance wagons; water carts; forage carts; and G.S. wagons for medical stores and baggage; and cook's wagon.

Train transport—(under the A.S.C.): one cart for each cavalry field ambulance, and one G.S. wagon for each field ambulance to carry supplies.

A.S.C. drivers.—All drivers are provided by the A.S.C. When in the field, rations, &c., for these men are carried in the train transport of the unit to which the men are attached.

Spare drivers for train transport are included in the war establishment of the A.S.C. company of the train to which the drivers belong.

The *personnel* and animals of the train transport allotted to a field ambulance will accompany it by rail and oversea, joining the A.S.C. train on arrival in the area of concentration.

4. Horses, spare.—Spare draught horses are allowed at the rate of 10 per cent. A driver is allowed for each pair of spare horses.

A note as to the arrangements for veterinary services and the shoeing of horses follows the establishment and transport tables in the case of each unit.

One field veterinary chest is carried by each field ambulance or cavalry field ambulance.

6. Batmen.—Bâtmén in the field are allowed at the rate of one for each dismounted officer, or mounted officer with one horse, and two for each mounted officer with two horses.

All bâtmén are trained soldiers, and are available for duty.

7. Reinforcement.—Drafts to replace wastage are calculated for the medical services at the rate of 30 per cent. for *personnel* with field units, and at the rate of 20 per cent. for medical units on the L. of C. during the first year.

Details shown in the tables in Section 2 as “left at the base” include the 1st reinforcement calculated at 10 per cent. of the rank

and file, and mobilize with the unit; they are attached to one of the general base dépôts.

8. War outfit.—War outfit is the material of all kinds which a unit requires for war.

The method of carrying it is laid down in Sections 3-5, and Appendices 4, 5, 6, and 8.

- (a) **Ordnance stores.**—The ordnance stores required on mobilization by the various medical units are laid down in the mobilization store tables (A.Fs. G 1098, 59-67) for each separate unit. As these forms are revised periodically in accordance with all changes approved, they are to be regarded as the correct scale by which a unit is to be equipped on mobilization. Saddlery for those officers who are not in possession of it in peace, is provided by the A.O.D. on mobilization, and is included in the mobilization store tables of the various units.
- (b) **Clothing and necessities.**—The clothing and necessities required on mobilization are detailed in the Regulations for the Clothing of the Army, Part III.
- (c) **Supplies.**—Details of the authorized scale of supplies will be found in War Establishments and Allowance Regulations.
- (d) **Stationery.**—The stationery considered necessary for the medical services in the field is shown in "Tables of Books, Army Forms, and Stationery taken into the field by units of the Expeditionary Force," issued with Army Orders. A list of contents is pasted inside the lid of each stationery box.
- (e) **Medical Equipment.**—Details of the medical equipment will be found in Regulations for the Army Medical Service.*

9. Blankets.—Blankets for *personnel* are not included in the normal scale of war outfit; but, when specially ordered, one blanket per man will be carried. The extra *personnel*, horses, and vehicles required, are shown in notes on pp. 15 and 21.

10. Replenishment of stores.—General requisites, such as spare parts, and materials for repair, are calculated on the assumption that it will be possible to replenish them at intervals of about a fortnight.

11. Mobilization.—The arrangements for bringing the various medical units up to War Establishment in men and horses, and for the completion of their war outfit are laid down in Mobilization Regulations.

Orders for movement, when mobilization is complete, will be issued from the War Office to General Officers Commanding-in-Chief.

12. Geneva Convention.—The articles of the Geneva Convention are contained in the Manual of Military Law and in R.A.M.C. Training.

* These will be included in the Medical Manual—War, in course of preparation.

REMARKS.

The medical officer detailed to any of these units will be attached to the regimental head-quarters, and will be provided with the following *personnel* from the units :—

- 1 lance-corporal, as orderly.
- 1 private, as orderly and driver of the Maltese cart.
- 1 bātman (2 with cavalry, horse artillery, and mounted infantry).

The scale of medical equipment is laid down in Regulations for the Army Medical Service. When necessary, the medical equipment will be replenished by requisition on the nearest depôt of medical stores or field ambulance. A Maltese cart is provided for its transport† and that of the stretchers. It is at all times at the disposal of the medical officer. With cavalry, artillery (except a divisional ammunition column and a medium siege artillery brigade), mounted infantry, and a cavalry train, the cart is drawn by two horses, in other units by one horse. Baggage will be carried in train transport.

With cavalry, horse artillery, and mounted infantry units, two riding horses are allowed, with other units one horse.

The *personnel* for water and sanitary duties is detailed in Table C, page 11.

* Do not normally form part of the Expeditionary Force.

† Except in the case of a heavy siege artillery brigade.

NOTES.

B.—*Regimental Units.*

The medical arrangements for units for whom no medical officer is provided in war establishments are as follows:—

Head-Quarters of cavalry divisional artillery and of divisional artillery—in charge of a medical officer with an artillery unit, to be detailed by the officer commanding cavalry divisional artillery or divisional artillery.

Cavalry divisional engineers and divisional engineers—in charge of the medical officer with the head-quarters of the cavalry divisional engineers or divisional engineers.

Head-Quarters of cavalry, mounted and infantry brigades and mounted brigade train—in charge of a medical officer of a unit of the brigade, to be detailed by the brigadier-general commanding.

Heavy battery and ammunition column, and divisional mounted infantry companies—in charge of a medical officer to be detailed by the assistant director of medical services of the division.

Army troops squadrons—in charge of the medical officer with the army troops train.

Army troops engineers—in charge of the medical officers with bridging trains.

Units on lines of communication*—in charge of a medical officer to be detailed by the representative of the director of medical services with the head-quarters of the Inspector-General of Communications.

NOTE.—When a blanket per man is specially ordered to be carried, one forage cart will be required in addition per section. For these vehicles 2 extra A.S.C. drivers and 4 extra draught horses will be added to the transport details attached. This extra transport is sufficient for the carriage of tents in addition if these are ordered to be taken.

NOTES.

D.—*Cavalry Field Ambulance.*

1. Cavalry field ambulances are divisional troops ; their organization and duties are laid down in Field Service Regulations, Part II., and R.A.M.C. Training, Part III.

2. The fitting of harness and saddlery on mobilization, as well as the repair of equipment and shoeing of animals on field service will be carried out by artificers of the cavalry divisional or mounted brigade train.

3. The horses are in veterinary charge of the veterinary officer with the cavalry or mounted brigade train.

4. On the line of march the unit will normally follow in rear of the brigade ammunition columns ; the road space required is 275 yards, and the time taken in passing a given point is rather more than $2\frac{1}{2}$ minutes.

5. The camping or bivouac space required is 80×180 yards.

6. The load for the forage cart with two horses should not as a rule exceed 1,200 lbs., for the G.S. wagon with 4 horses, 2,700 lbs. The loads are detailed in Section 5.

7. A cavalry field ambulance requires a railway train composed as follows :—16 compartments, 11 cattle trucks, 14 vehicle trucks, and 1 brake van. The gross tonnage is about 1,400 tons for ocean voyages ; and 850 tons for short voyages of 24 hours and under.

8. Transport marked with the Geneva Cross will not be taken away or used for other purposes during a campaign except by the order of the Commander-in-Chief, in case of emergency. The Geneva Cross must be removed before use by any other than the medical service.

9. Details of the encampments, tent pitching, &c., are laid down in R.A.M.C. Training.

For these vehicles three extra A.S.C. drivers and six extra draught horses will be added to the transport details attached. This extra transport is sufficient for the carriage of tents in addition if these are ordered to be taken.

NOTES.

E.—*Field Ambulance.*

1. Field ambulances are divisional troops ; their organization and duties are laid down in Field Service Regulations, Part II., and R.A.M.C. Training, Part III.

2. The fitting of harness and saddlery on mobilization, as well as the repair of equipment and shoeing of animals on active field service, will be carried out by artificers of the Divisional or Army Troops Train and Supply Column.

3. The horses are in veterinary charge of the veterinary officers with the field artillery brigades, and are detailed by the O.C. Divisional Artillery ; with army troops the horses are in veterinary charge of the veterinary officer with the Army Troops Train.

4. On the line of march the unit will normally march in rear of the brigade ammunition columns ; the road space required is 464 yards. A section 174 yards, B or C section 135 yards. The time occupied in passing a given point is about $4\frac{1}{2}$ minutes.

5. The camping or bivouac space required is 120×200 yards.

6. The maximum load for the forage cart with two horses is 1,500 lbs., for the G.S. wagons with 4 horses 3,000 lbs. The loads are detailed in Section 5.

7. A field ambulance requires 2 railway trains each composed as follows :—16 compartments, 7 cattle trucks, 10 vehicle trucks, 1 brake van. The gross tonnage is about 2,200 tons for ocean voyages, and 1,300 tons for short voyages of 24 hours and under.

8. Transport marked with the Geneva Cross will not be taken away or used for other purposes during a campaign except by the order of the Commander-in-Chief, in case of emergency. The Geneva Cross must be removed before use by any other than the Medical Service.

9. Details of the encampments, tent pitching, &c., are laid down in R.A.M.C. Training.

NOTES.

Packs.—The packs of the transport sergeant and of the drivers of 1st line transport vehicles may be carried on the vehicles. Those of drivers of spare horses and of pack animals will be on the man.

Saddle Blanket.—Under the riding or pack saddle. Saddle blankets for officers' horses and for horses with luggage saddles are carried in the vehicles, on the march.

Heel ropes are allowed for use with restive horses on a scale of 25 per cent. An additional peg is issued with each heel rope.

Picketing gear (or any part of it) may, at the discretion of the commanding officer, be carried in the transport vehicles. A proportion of **mallets**, **heel peg** (about 1 to 20 horses) will be carried on 1st line transport vehicles.

Nose bags.—When luggage saddle is worn on the off horse, one bag on each side of the luggage saddle is fastened to the near arch (or ring with O.P. saddle).

Carried in the wagon when luggage saddle is not worn.

Horse brush and rubber.—The method of carrying is left to the discretion of officers commanding, except that these articles are not to be in the nosebag.
